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A Few Thoughts from Sr. M. Christine

Dear Friends,

November is a month for Thanksgiving, beginning with days of remembrance and gratitude for those who have gone before us and ending with an All-American feast celebrating the gifts of family and friendship in the great land we call home. morial Day, which honors those who *died* serving in war, Veterans Day honors all men and women who have served in any branch of the military. The month begins with All Saints' Day on November one; a day many of us can recall from our childhood as being a holiday from school. It was easy to wake up early that morning after an evening of trick-or-treating, sorting and counting all the candy we had collected from our neighbors. And while I also remember having to go to Mass that day, I doubt that I really knew why. Eventually, I learned to appreciate the feast of All Saints and its meaning in my life. Praying the Litany of the Saints, I came to realize just how often I would call upon saints throughout the day: to help pass a test, to find something lost, to cure an illness, to just "make things better." On All Saints' Day, we celebrate ALL saints, not just those canonized. We reflect on those who experience the eternal joy of heaven, adding our own prayers that loved ones, relatives, and friends are there among them. The saints are our models in their love for God and encourage us in our own struggles because like us, they endured the struggles of mankind.

On November 2, we continue our remembrances by celebrating the feast of All Souls' Day. We write in books or display pictures of those we wish to remember, those we love who have gone before us, their names read aloud in churches and chapels. We pray for their souls, recognizing that although they may no longer be with us, we share a spiritual union with them. Believing in the communion of saints means believing that the saints in heaven are praying for us; and that the church on earth, the souls in Purgatory and the saints in heaven are all united. This November 17, we will have a special Mass at the Home to remember all those who have died this past year. Although bittersweet, we will find joy in seeing loved one's families whom we have come to know and love.

November holds another day of solemnity and appreciation for men and women around the world:

Veterans' Day, celebrated on November 11. Unlike Memorial Day, which honors those who *died* serving in a war, Veterans Day honors all men and women who have served in any branch of the military. We acknowledge our appreciation and gratitude with parades, wreaths, and speeches. We also recognize that, just like the saint who did not aspire to become a saint, our country's men and women did not choose to serve to become a hero. But in the nation's eyes, each of them did. And we can't thank them enough.

As the end of November draws near, we look to the celebration of one of America's most cherished national holidays: Thanksgiving. One of the busiest travel times of the year, people from across the country and around the globe head "home" to be with family and friends on this day; a day filled with timeless traditions and favorite foods. In 1780, the first national Thanksgiving Day was declared as a response to a Congressional petition to be a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to acknowledge with grateful hearts the many favors of Almighty God. Two hundred and thirty-eight years later, the meaning of these words – our allegiance to God, our country, our families and fellow human beings – remains unchanged.

In the context of these special remembrance days of November, "Let us ever be mindful of the faith and spiritual values that have made our Nation great and that alone can keep us great." (Abraham Lincoln) Let us be grateful for all He has given us: saints to aid us, soldiers to defend us, and families and friends with love to sustain us. Above all, we thank our God for His promise that when our work on earth is done, He will be waiting in Heaven to welcome each of us home.
